#### Musical Achievements



Children in Class 3 have continued to take part in the Sound Start project. This involved them being given a brass, woodwind or percussion instrument, along with weekly lessons in school. This culminated in their annual concert on Wednesday 18th July.

Children in Class 2 recently took part in Children in Song. This involved them learning a number of songs from the musical The King With Cold Feet, and then performing them alongside children from 13 other

schools on stage at the Villa Marina.

#### Learning Logs

Over the year we have had some fantastic Learning Logs produced across the school. Highlights include nearly life size twin elephants, an amazing rainforest, a film review of their year, and not to forget the many cakes we have all enjoyed.





#### Trips and Visits

Since September we have organised and run over 35 separate trips out, in addition to our weekly visits to Ardwhallan. These have included Class 3 visiting the Gaiety Theatre to watch a performance of Romeo and Juliet, Class 2 visiting the Gaiety to see a Live Science Show. Visits to the Wild Life Park for Colour Me Wild and a general visit and Class 1 visiting the beach to find Blackbeard's stolen treasure.

All of these trips, unlike many other Island Schools, have been provided at no cost to parents, with all costs being paid for by the Friends of Jurby School.


#### **Sporting Achievements**

#### Underneath the Hot Sun - Jurby School Canoe to England

During the year children in Class 2 and 3 have been working in partnership with Ardwhallan Outdoor Education Centre to develop their team work, resilience and problem solving.



This culminated in a week long trip to North Wales for the children in Year 5 and 6. The children put their team work and resilience skills to the test every day, as they went back to basics, staying in a simple bunk house, half a mile from the nearest road, with limited electricity and no mobile phone signal. The children were forced to abandon their electronic lifestyle, and instead to focus on more basic needs including water preservation. The heat wave had nearly exhausted the bunk houses water supply, so the

children needed to conserve water, carry in drinking water, and carry back out with them all their rubbish. This brought to home issues around how wasteful we are as a society and what we can all do to cut down on waste.

The very hot weather meant that the planned programme had to be adapted to limit the children's exposure to the sun, and a planned trip to the summit of Glyder Fawr was changed to walk through woods on the lower slopes of Snowdon before a cooling swim in a river, and the opportunity to sit under a water fall, something none of the children had experienced before.

As part of the trip the children undertook a two day expedition canoeing along the Llangollen Canal, the first time a Manx Primary School has done so. The children spent the night in tents, a new

experience for some, before finishing the expedition the next day. For many the high point of the trip was canoeing over the Pontcysyllte Aqueduct, and through two tunnels, one of which was nearly half a kilometre long. The journey then ended with a trip over the Chirk Aqueduct and paddling across the border from Wales into England.



#### New Library

In March we opened our new Community Library. We have been told by reliable sources that we have the best Primary School Library on the Island, and both the children and staff love using it. To date over 500 books have been borrowed (and returned), by



both children and adults from our Community.

Over the Summer we are going to be cataloging all of the books for adults that have been donated and these will be available to borrow from September. Please spread the word.
